Green Faith events, Opening Prayer Ceremony



The service was held in front of the UNQH on Friday, September 19.

A Global Prayer Ceremony with a Wisdom Keepers Delegation

On Sunday, September 21st—the International Day of Peace—a tipi was erected on the sacred grounds of the Union Theological Seminary. This location is steps away from the Columbia University campus and next to the Riverside Church, where Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered one of his most memorable sermons voicing his compelling opposition to the war in Vietnam.

Weaving together teachings from Indigenous Wisdom Keepers and interfaith leaders, we were guided in a meditation intended to reconnect us with the Earth and rekindle our inner light. This practice was aimed at charging our internal waters and raising the vibration of the planet as one unified whole. We gathered waters from various sacred sources around the planet into a single vessel, which will now hold the blessings of humanity.

These waters will travel with the delegation to Brazil, where they will remain part of the ceremony throughout November at COP30. Led by Jacob Johns and Kareena Gore, and graced by the unexpected visit of former Vice President Al Gore, the ceremony became a deeply profound, spiritual, and magical experience through the power of storytelling.

We were deeply honored to host Jacob Johns (Akimel O'odham / Hopi), an international environmental systems strategist and multidisciplinary artist. Rooted in cultural heritage, Jacob spoke of weaving traditional knowledge and ancient wisdom into the fabric of global climate spaces, demonstrating how grassroots leadership cultivates practical, long-term solutions for the world.

In a warm exchange of dialogue and storytelling, Jacob and BK Juan explored the quiet pragmatism of spirituality when facing chaos, insecurity, and darkness. They invited the audience to experience, through meditation, the profound benefits of imbibing spiritual light—a subtle sustenance for both soul and body.

Together, they unfolded the timeless truth that life is not a line, but a circle. While the old world may appear to be crumbling, a new reality is always, already, emerging from within. They illuminated how an attitude infused with care, hope, courage, and determination is not merely optimistic, but a practical source of power. It is the very energy needed to navigate this great transition, to midwife the new world being born.

Climate Resilience in Action at the American Museum of Natural History

On this final and remarkable event that we attended, "Climate, Community, and the City," was a powerful and multi-faceted exploration of New York's role in the climate crisis. It brilliantly blended art, grassroots action, and high-level policy. The evening featured an inspiring musical lecture by activist Madame Gandhi, a series of rapid-fire "Lightning Lectures" on local projects, and a keynote from NYC's Chief Climate Officer, Rohit T. Aggarwala, on the city's climate strategy. It was an educational, entertaining, and visually stunning demonstration of local leadership in the face of global challenges.

NYC Climate Week Self-Organized Ethical Stocktake Dialogue

On September 25, 2025, a self-organized dialogue convened approximately 20 grassroots, faith, and UN leaders at the Buddhist Tzu Chi Center. This gathering, co-hosted by several ethical and religious organizations, served as a grassroots contribution to the Global Ethical Stocktake (GES) leading up to COP30. In an atmosphere of spirituality and confidentiality, participants engaged in reflective discussions to elevate the moral dimensions of the climate crisis. The dialogue aimed to reframe climate action by drawing on diverse cultural and spiritual traditions, identify barriers to change, and develop strategies to mobilize broader societal action. The inputs from this and similar self-organized dialogues will be synthesized into a report and presented at COP30 in Belém, Brazil.
